This workshop will introduce an innovative emergency preparedness and response simulation tool for training public health professionals. Through this workshop, Emergency Managers and Public Health Physicians will have experience with a scenario which allows them to use real time surveillance tools for improved situational awareness and improved decision making. The two main tools will be ACES and PHIMS. The tool, developed by KFL&A Public Health, enhances the traditional emergency preparedness exercise with simulated 'real-time' surveillance data using two tools, the Acute Care Enhanced Surveillance system (ACES) and Public Health Information Management System (PHIMS). Through group role-play, workshop attendees will actively participate in managing a simulated public health incident in a local public health agency setting involving different health system roles and collaboration.

The panel will explore the Canadian Red Cross (CRC) engagement with Syrian populations in five countries and on a Mediterranean service ship along the continuum-of-care from Syria to Canada. Data arising from CRC end of mission (EOM) reports (n=8) and CRC Syria Response Evaluation will be discussed, further enriched by the operational experiences of deployed technical personnel and front-line service providers in Canada. A Syrian who journeyed from Syria to Canada will outline his/her recommendations for improving service coordination and delivery from the perspective of a service-user.
