Zika, Ebola, hurricanes, earthquakes, even antibiotic-resistant microbes public health emergencies cover a wide-range of events and disaster medicine and public health professionals are expected to be experts in anticipating, preparing, and responding to all of them. Educational resources and information tools from the U.S. Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response (ASPR), the US National Library of Medicine (NLM) and the U.S. National Center for Disaster Medicine and Public Health (NCDMPH) help the people on the front lines of health keep informed and up-to-date so they can better serve their diverse communities. Scenarios depicting sudden-onset events, emerging infectious diseases, hazmat/CBRNE incidents, and unique issues of specific populations will be used to demonstrate how various tools and resources from ASPR, NLM and NCDMPH can be used to prepare for, respond to, and recover from a wide variety of incidents. Tools and resources that will be discussed and demonstrated in the scenarios include:PHE.gov http://phe.govNLM Disaster Health - http://disasterinfo.nlm.nih.govNCDMPH Knowledge and Learning - http://ncdmph.usuhs.eduSudden onset events include natural disasters as well as HazMat and CBRN incidents. Emergency response tools such as WISER, CHEMM, and REMM will be demonstrated to assist with both planning and responding to these types of incidents. The emPOWER map from ASPR helps identify and meet the needs of people who rely on electrically powered medical and assistive equipment. Resource guides from NLM and topic collections from ASPR provide "just what I need information, just in time" for natural disasters and other sudden onset events. Engaging with communities to identify their needs following a disaster is critical and NowTrending, uses real time information from Twitter to identify major issues to address. Quality information from trusted sources describing what is known about the disease is critical to develop an informed response. As new information becomes available, guidelines and recommendations need to be updated and disseminated quickly. ASPR, NLM, and NCDMPH ensure the collection of this material and disseminate it widely to all affected communities. Many groups have unique or specific needs in disasters and public health emergencies. Resources and tools from NLM and NCDMPH look at the needs of a variety of special populations including children, pregnant women, and people with access and functional needs. Participants will gain an understanding of the various tools offered by three agencies and will have an opportunity to practice using the resources in a series of guided scenarios. (Note: Participants are encouraged to bring a laptop, tablet, or smartphone for the exercises and scenarios.)

Evacuations: So You Think you are Prepared?

Neil Cameron is a practicing community pharmacist in Athabasca, Alberta, who has worked through three Alberta Wildfire evacuations since 2011, most recently the Fort McMurray Wildfire in May of 2016. This session will inform the attendees of each of the three wildfires and the unique experiences Neil worked through to accommodate evacuees, collaborate with other healthcare professionals, and emergency response agencies. From the Slave Lake Fire of 2011, Wabasca Fire of 2015, and the Fort McMurray Fire of 2016, Neil has experienced a disaster response that was totally unprepared, to a prepared response, how each was different, the same, and the profound effects each has had. Given the geographical location of Athabasca, it was a natural egress point from all three Fire Evacuations. Neil will also speak to one's individual emergency awareness, preparedness and capacity to assist in disaster situations. Having grown up in Fort McMurray, this evacuation had a profound personal effect. Neil will explain how this affected his capacity to assist and how to incorporate his learnings into part of your self-assessment for Emergency Preparedness/Capacity.
